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Kent Lions Fund Vision Charts

Kent School District Superintendent, Dr. Calvin Watts, recently met with Kent School District nurses and Kent Lions to celebrate the successful implementation of new vision charts in the district's 29 elementary schools.

Research showed there was a need to check young children's distant and near vision. Uncorrected near vision causes children to have reading problems. Newly adopted state requirements necessitated replacing the older eye charts with updated charts that allow detection of both near and distance vision problems. However, no funds were provided to acquire them.

The Kent School District, faced with a decrease in their budget, had no means to be compliant with the new state law. The Kent Lions Club heard of this problem through a school nurse and assigned Lion Cheryl Croft, who is also an optometrist, to craft a solution. After consideration, the Kent Lions purchased the necessary eye charts for around \$4,000 and delivered them to the school district. The school nurses, pictured below, have placed them into service and report they have identified vision problems in a number of young students.

The Art of Recognition

"Recognition is a behaviour deeply rooted in Lionism, but it is also a tradition that could become obsolete unless members commit to implementing it regularly... keeping it fresh and relevant... and making it a part of their lives" (*The Art of Recognition*, pg. 1). There is also a Lions University Master's course on-line entitled "**Recognition**". It does not take long and is easy to attend.

Everyone deserves recognition, whether a task accomplished is simple or difficult. Recognition acknowledges that what you did matters. It might not matter to many, but it matters to at least one other. Recognition is any act of appreciation that lets people know you notice their effort. We all have a responsibility to recognize others' efforts, whether we are in a position of authority or a co-worker. At times, recognition by one's peers is highly meaningful.

Recognition demonstrates the importance of each member of the team. Collectively, you can do so much, where individually you can do so little. You can also celebrate the quality and performance of the individual, ensuring that a job well done and of higher standards is recognized as such. Be specific in your recognition of people: let others know why this recognition is being made; under what circumstances; what was the result of their efforts.

The venue for recognition is important. The setting should be amongst the peer group of the person being recognized. The recognition becomes less significant if that person is not present to receive such praise.

But such needs are not always well publicized in our communities, so it is up to us, as Lions, to keep tabs on the needs of our schools, care givers and first responders, who are often left with short budgets and hard decisions.

Lions Project New Hope NW

Lions Project New Hope NW is an MD19 recognized organization dedicated to providing service to combat veterans who suffer from post-traumatic stress (PTS). The military has dropped the term "Disorder" or "D" from use and no longer refers to PTSD. Its purpose is to provide opportunities and tools for combat veterans and their families to identify and address issues that are preventing them from resuming normal relations within the family and the community.

Studies have revealed that up to 31% of combat veterans suffer from PTS. Domestic violence, suicides, and some types of criminal behavior are frequently attributed to PTS. Based on the most recent data available, the suicide rate among male combat veterans is exactly double the rate of males in the general population. The rate of suicide among female combat veterans is three times higher than females in the U.S. More disturbing, a study has shown that the rate of suicides among children of combat veterans is three times higher than children in the general population.

Lions Project New Hope is primarily a family oriented project. Working jointly with the PTSD Foundation of America, education and therapy workshops are held for veterans and their families throughout the summer at Camp Greenwood in Lacey, WA. This also includes family bonding events such as canoeing, fishing, and a variety of sports activities. Special retreats for both male and female combat veterans without families are also held each summer. [Click here to visit the Project New Hope website.](#)

Lions Project New Hope depends upon both the financial support from Lions Clubs and Lions volunteers. Free professional support is provided by licensed therapists affiliated with the PTSD Foundation of America. All services, including meals, lodging, and family activities are available without cost to veterans and their families.

Lions Project New Hope is planning to expand its services to combat veterans in other locations in Washington State. The LPNHW Board is currently negotiating with several camps to achieve this purpose. The Board would also like to assist in developing a program for Canadian combat veterans in British Columbia. Project New Hope welcomes all MD19 Districts to have a representative on its Board of Directors. If there is an interest, please contact me at rsmircich@msn.com.

41 USA/CANADA LIONS LEADERSHIP FORUMS & COUNTING!

The first USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum was held in Rosemont, IL, in 1977. About 1,000 attended. PIP Johnny Balbo from La Grange, IL, was Chairperson, serving at the direction of International President Joseph M. McLoughlin, a Stamford Connecticut Lion.

A Renton Lion since 1964, then PDG Roger Richert (District 19B 1974-75) first met PIP Johnny at the 1971 International Convention and then spent time with him again at the 1972 Convention. Perhaps that is what enticed him to attend the Lions event in 1977.

In his program notes, Roger wrote that he was, "able to listen and converse with top knowledgeable Lions from throughout the country". 41 years later, with perfect USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum attendance under his belt, he knows the truth behind those notes. The Forum is designed to educate Lions on every aspect of Lionism, and to give grassroots Lions personal accessibility to Lion leaders from all over the world. The USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum offers opportunities for personal development and leadership training in membership and club development, and also promotes building special Lion friendships across Canada and the US.

Over the years, four of the Forums have been held in Canada and 37 in the United States. Average attendance is around 2,400. Exceptional motivational speakers and seminar presentations make 'The Forum' a must-do event for many.

At the 2000 Forum in Tucson AZ, it was realized that a small group of Lions had attended all the events to date. So, at the 2001 Forum in Halifax, Nova Scotia, PID Roger arranged for a group photo of the seven 100% attendees who were present. They were PID Roger [WA], PDG Henry Tolk [MI], PDG Bill McLaughlin [PA], PDG Bruce Strome [FL, now SC], PIP Kay Fukushima [CA], PID Ted Fusco [PA], and PID Earl Maddox [CO]. They became known as the "Magnificent Seven". They treasured their comradery and decades of special memories. Photos were taken each year to commemorate their special relationship.

As years passed, unfortunately, this band of brothers became the "Sensational Six", then the "Fantastic Four", and finally the "Terrific Trio". That moniker has happily lasted for several years. But this year, while not being lost to death, PDG Bill McLaughlin was not able to attend due to illness. So this September, in Portland, OR, the Saturday noon luncheon's spotlight shone on the "Dynamic Duo", PID Roger Richert and PDG Bruce Strome (below). Both of these fine Lions agree that attending USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forums provides many opportunities, lasting Lion friendships being the greatest benefit of all. Did they pre-register for next year's Forum, in Columbus OH? You'd better believe it! And, they encourage you to begin your own 'legacy of Lions learning', by joining them there!

District Leo Chairpersons and all Leo Advisors need to download the "LEO OF THE YEAR" award form from the LCI website now so that they have time to provide the requisite Club, District and MD19 endorsements. [Click here to download the form.](#)

1. The first step is for the Leo Club Advisor to fill out, print and sign the downloaded nomination form, this must be sent into the District Governor by February 1st.
2. A screening committee, which includes the District Governor and the District LEO Chairperson, will select one nominee as the District Leo of the Year Recipient. This District Leo of the Year will be recognized and honored at your District Spring Conference/Convention.

Once selected, the Nomination Form must be sent to the MD19 Office by the District Governor after he/she has signed the form. The form must be received in the MD19 office on or before March 1st. Governors, if you email the form to the MD19 Office and do not receive a confirmation email back from Theresa, please call the office to make sure that the email and form have been received. The MD19 Office email address is md19lions@lionsmd19.com, the mailing address is 4141 West Maplewood Avenue, Bellingham, WA 98226.

3. A screening committee selects the MD19 Leo of the Year Nominee from all of the District nominees that have been submitted. Once selected, the Nomination Form for the MD19 Leo of the Year Nominee will be signed by the MD19 Council Chairperson and mailed by the MD19 Office to Lions Clubs International to be received by LCI before April 1st.

It is important that the 2017-2018 First Half Dues have been paid prior to your conference or your voting Delegate(s) will be unable to vote. If you have not received a 2017-2018 First Half Dues statement, contact the MD19 Office for a copy immediately. Please confirm your club's correct contact information with the MD19 Office at the same time.

Voting at District Conferences. Elections will be held at each of the District Spring Conferences/Conventions for the District Governor, 1st and 2nd Vice District Governors, Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson. Electing the Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson at the District Conferences is the result of MD19 Constitution and By-Laws amendments passed at the 2016 Annual Convention. Delegates will be voting for the 2018-2019 Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson. The ballot boxes containing the ballots for Council and Vice Council Chairpersons will remain sealed until all of the conferences/conventions have been held. After the close of the final conference/convention, all of the ballots will be counted at the same time.

Candidates for Higher Office at the Zone and District levels. Your letter of intent and your club's letter of endorsement must be received by the MD19 Office, the District Governor and your Zone Chairperson on or before December 31st. This is a Constitutional requirement!

Any Candidate for MD19 Vice Council Chairperson. Your letter of Intent, your Club's Letter of Endorsement and **your Zone's Letter of Endorsement**

must be received by the MD19 Office, the District Governor, and the Vice District Governor on or before December 31st. This is a Constitutional requirement!

Service Activities (SARs). Clubs should be reporting activities that are **performed as a group** by the club's members. These projects may involve one or more Lions clubs as well as Lion foundations and can include non-member volunteers from the community and staff from local businesses. The litmus test for a service activity is that it is both club approved and administrated by many members of that club.

While it is wonderful that *individual* club members volunteer their time to local programs and Lions projects, these do not qualify as *club* events. The key word is "group".

Be genuine in your praise, it does little to just go through the motion of recognition just because it is politically correct. People will recognize insincerity in praise, which is worse than giving no praise at all.

Recognition should be made as immediately as possible. As an example, after a great report is given about a successful club project, recognition should be made by a Club leader, complete with an appropriate certificate or any such token as is customary with that Club. Keep the recognition proportional to the action being recognized. The key is not to wait too long. This is part of the celebration of success that is so necessary in the motivation of people, especially volunteers; let them know that what they do is priceless. Be imaginative with your method of recognition. You can be different. "*Your Club, Your Way*".

Why should we recognize? Motivation is a key to success. Show your appreciation of efforts at what has been accomplished. It is not simply a matter of people doing their jobs. They will do their jobs better and be happier when people recognize their efforts; that they went steps further than what was needed. Please, show appreciation for those extended efforts.

Do recognition well, do it often, make it meaningful.
